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

Pipe Bands that wear Maclaine of Lochbuie Tartan.

As at 2016, the pipe bands named below are those that are known to wear the Maclaine of Lochbuie dress tartan.

Red Rose of Lochbuie Pipes and Drums - Netherlands.

The Red Rose of Lochbuie was established in 1990 and is the officially recognized band of Clan Maclaine of Lochbuie. The Band performs and participates regularly in events in Holland and abroad, and participated in the 2009 Homecoming Gathering in Edinburgh.

Coastal Scottish Pipe Band WA Perth, Western Australia.

The band was founded in 1898 and adopted the Maclaine of Lochbuie tartan in 1975. They are a significant pipe band that has participated in events across Australia and New Zealand.

Co. Tyrone, Northern Ireland.

Founded in 1923, adopted the Lochbuie tartan in 1970. The Gortaclare is a substantial band that participates in events across Northern Ireland.

Benraw Pipe Band Co. Down, Northern Ireland.

Established in 1946, this well established band participates events across Northern Ireland.

Hornsby RSL Pipe Band NSW, Australia.

The band was established in 1961 and is focused primarily on events within New South Wales.

City of St. John's Pipe Band St John's, Newfoundland, Canada.

Originally formed as the Newfoundland Pipe Band in 1973 but changed their name to City of St John's in 1988 to more accurately reflect their home base.

Litchfield Hills Pipe Band Litchfield County, Connecticut, USA.

Established in 1976, the band performs primarily within the State of Connecticut.

Each turret is provided with small windows and smaller square openings, probably firing apertures. A steeply raked loop with a double aperture protects the entrance to the castle.

Historical notes:

Following the death of Ewen, John's (5th Lochbuie) celebrated fourth son, Hector Mor of Duart, and the Maclean of Scallastle, expelled John from Moy Castle in 1538. John died shortly thereafter. In 1540 John's son Murdoch Gearr, Short Murdoch, returned from Antrim and supported by the MacCormacks, recaptured Moy and expelled Scallastle. Murdoch was legitimated in 1538, he being the issue of his father's union with a servant when Duart had previously incarcerated him around 1520.

In January 1679 Hector Maclean and John Campbell, seized Moy 11^{th} from Lachlan, Castle Lochbuie, who was imprisoned in Duart Castle for 6 months, and was still demanding restitution of his castle and lands six year later in 1683. The Maclaines opposed the Revolution Settlement and joined the Royalist cause at Killiekrankie. As a consequence, in October 1690,


> The stone lintel above the door is cracked in two places and will be secured using stainless steel straps and fixings. The access steps up to the door will be cleaned and re-set or replaced and the stones around the entrance cleaned and pointed. The door, an early 20th -Century addition will be repaired and all the work will be logged for archiving purposes. Some further work will also be completed on the upper floor levels.

Lochbuie makes Clan History

As clan members, we spend much of our time looking into the past. Looking for ancestors, looking for artifacts, looking for clan historical stories and personalities. What if a clan chief de-

cides to add to history and perhaps start a new chapter.

After a little research, Lochbuie discovered that, to his knowledge, no clan chief has ever had an official vocal group. The nearest to it was a Harpist the family had some two hundred years ago.

Making new history, on the 5th of May, 2017, Lochbuie signed a letter to the D. M. Davis Male Voice Choir of Jackson, Ohio, USA, confirming their appointment as the Clan Maclaine of Lochbuie's official choir in the United States of America.

In recognition of this honor, at their summer concert on 11 June this year, the official letter was presented to the Jackson Historical Society for it records and a certificate was presented to the Matkay Cultural Arts Center for display.

The Lochbuie Chiefly line.

1st - Hector – *Eachainn Reaganach* or Hector the Astute.ector the Astute.

Granted lands in Mull and at Lochbuie by the Lord of the Isles in 1360. Hector had two sons, Murdoch, 2nd Lochbuie, and Charles – *Tearlach mac Eachainn* - progenitor of the Macleans of Kingairloch and the Macleans of Dochgarroch.

2nd – Murdoch – *Murchadh Ruaidh* or Red Murdoch.

3rd - John. Received charter of lands in Lochiel, Duror and Glencoe from the Lord of the Isles in 1461.

4th – Hector. Witnessed a charter in 1478. Two sons – John (5th Lochbuie) and Murdoch, 1st of Scallastle.

5th – John – *Iain Og*. Received a royal charter for all lands granted by the Lord of the Isles from King James IV in March 1494. A favourite of James IV. His tenure as chief is notable for the numerous conflicts he embarked upon during the late 1400's and early 1500's. Father of Ewen of the Little Head (fourth son). b.ca. 1470. d. 1537.
